DETAILED PROVISIONAL PROGRAMME OF WORK

1. PURPOSE AND METHOD OF WORK

In 1976 the Regional Sub-Committee A passed the following resolution: The Regional Sub-Committee

> "REQUESTS the Regional Director to convene, within the next two years, a high level Consultation on the relationships between educational institutions responsible for training health personnel and Ministries and other agencies in the public and private sector responsible for health services development, with a view to achieving closer co-ordination between all concerned".

The present Consultation has been sought in pursuance of the concern expressed by Member Countries to find ways and means for strengthening the co-ordination of Health Services and Health Manpower Development programmes.

Members of the Consultation are invited therefore to find solutions to difficult and pressing problems, namely to assist in the development of an action plan by which countries in the Region, in collaboration with WHO, can make significant progress towards identified goals.

In order to achieve such a plan in the limited time available, a working method is proposed which differs from the usual "Conference" or "Seminar" techniques. Essentially this is the nature of this meeting as a "Consultation". The method can be described as "task-oriented": that is to say, certain problems will be posed, and the Members of the Consultation will be asked to respond in fairly concrete form. The WHO Secretariat, having reviewed existing policy statements, past recommendations on the subject, etc., has tried to pose the problems or questions in such a way that they can produce responses which will be meaningful and will result in a report which can provide useful and practical alternative solutions to the problems posed, and also provide guidelines to Member Countries and WHO for the coming years.

Problems, then, have been identified and are submitted, in the form of questions to which answers are sought. Each of the principal questions is followed by a set of subsidiary questions which seek to further focus attention on some of the relevant issues.

By actively participating in suggesting solutions to these and other problems each Member will have the opportunity to make a significant contribution to the development of an effective action plan.

To make this possible, working groups will be established and relatively little time is allocated to formal presentation.

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In general, each of the sets of questions into which the overall problems of co-ordination between Health Services and Health Manpower Development has been divided, will be introduced briefly by the Secretariat. Following this the working groups will meet and address themselves to the problems posed. Each of the reports of the respective group deliberations will be submitted by the Group Rapporteurs to General Rapporteurs for consolidation and consideration by the Consultation generally.

It is expected that in this way the summary report and recommendations will truly reflect the views of all Members of the Consultation.

Of the thirteen items in the programme, eight will be devoted to the consideration of the five major problems posed. The major part of Sessions III and IV (items 9, 10, 11) in which the actual strategies or ways and means to strengthen co-ordination are addressed, has been allocated a significantly greater period of time than others.

It is confidently expected that the Consultation will meet the challenge by making a significant contribution to the development of policies and by providing an orientation for future action.
