Programme accepted 1974, expected numbers approximately six to eight. Temporarily in abeyance due to changes in Government and lack of clear Health Department policy

Diploma Medical Information Science

Programme accepted 1974, expected numbers three to four (two local, two overseas). Recruitment more difficult than anticipated, feeble support from Government and Medical Research Council

General Practitioner Training Programme as part of Registrarship

Academic component one year part-time course. Progress is being made in this area. Large Government financial aid to increase teaching facilities expected 1977 or 1978
